Learning and Study Skills Inventory (LASSI) Scores – 2002

During the student summer orientation sessions, 238 freshmen (including Choices students) completed the 2002 LASSI. The LASSI contains ten scales defined below. Scores below the 50th percentile are considered “at risk” and are designated by shading; those above the 75th percentile are considered exceptionally strong and are designated by bold type face.

LASSI scales across the top of the table represent the following categories:

ATT – attitude and interest
 MOT – motivation, diligence, self-discipline, and willingness to work hard
 TMT – use of time-management principles for academic tasks
 ANX – anxiety and worry about school performance
 CON – concentration and attention to academic tasks
 INP – information processing, acquiring knowledge, and reasoning
 SMI – Selecting main ideas and recognizing important information
 STA – Use of support techniques and materials
 SFT – self testing, reviewing, and preparing for classes
 TST – test strategies and preparing for tests

Introduction

The 2002 Freshman Student Profile Survey was scheduled and administered on Saturday, August 24th from 2 p.m. to 3 p.m. as part of the Welcome Week activities. A total of 201 freshmen completed the questionnaire answering the majority of the questions. Freshmen on sports team were given the survey at a different time because of the practice and scrimmage schedule. Sixty-seven (67) freshmen on teams filled out the survey. Additionally, 62 surveys were sent to freshmen commuter students. This mailing was an attempt to have more complete response from the new commuter students who may not have attended the Week of Welcome activities. Of the 63 commuter surveys, 19 were returned (30.2%). Total number of freshman surveys completed was 287 out of the total number in the class of 408, thus 70.3% of the freshman class participated and completed the survey. This number compares similarly to the survey return rate of 71% in 2001.

Student responses to the questionnaire are used to provide a general summary of Delaware Valley College's 2002 freshman class. This summary is presented below. Charts depicting student responses to each of the questions are presented on pages 9 through 17. The survey was modified slightly from last year's survey. Questions added, on the advice of Student Life, regarded whether or not students had used a counseling or guidance center or tutoring center in the past and for what reasons. In addition, the order of the questions in the survey was changed to see if there would be a higher response rate to some of the more sensitive questions. In general, there did seem to be a higher response rate to those questions. Several questions were added to this year's survey regarding the freshmen's primary source of information and which newspapers they read.

2002 Freshman Student Profile—Summary

On-campus living, extra-curricular activities and sports participation:

- The majority of freshmen (91.6%) stated that they will be living on campus, while only 8.4% reported they will be living off campus (Question 1).
- A majority of freshmen answered they anticipate going home 2 to 3 weekends per month, 42.5%, and 30.8% anticipate going home 1 weekend per month, 17.7% plan to go home less than one weekend a month, and 9.0% anticipate going home every weekend (Question 2).
- Most freshmen (35.0%) reported that their home is between 50 and 100 miles, 32.9% state that their home is less than 50 miles from DVC, 29.7% report that their home is between 100 and 500 miles away, and 2.4% state their home is more than 500 miles away (Question 3).

- Ninety-two point three (92.3) percent of the freshmen stated that they participated in extra-curricular activities while in High School (Question 4), 61.3% participated on High School Varsity teams (Question 6), and 90.9% stated that they plan on participating in extra-curricular activities while at DVC (Question 5). Fifty-four point four (54.4) percent stated that they will be joining intercollegiate sports (Question 7), and 46.5% reported that they anticipate participating in intramural sports (Question 8).
- Sixty-three (63.0) percent of the freshmen responded that they were planning on holding a job that ranged from 10 to 20 hours per week while in college; 19.2% said they did not plan to work and the remainder, 20%, were going to work more than 20 hours per week (Question 17).

Selection of DVC and Plans for Further Study

- Thirty-eight point six (38.6) percent of the freshmen reported that they learned about DVC from an alumni or friend while 7.0% learned of the college by the web page. Eleven point nine (11.9) percent learned of DVC from the mail or a brochure, 13.3% learned of DVC through a High School counselor, and 29.2% learned about DVC from other sources (Question 9).
- For 64.5% of the freshmen DVC was their first choice of college with 26.1% stating that DVC was their second choice (Question 10).
- Fifty-six point one (56.1) percent of the freshmen reported that the most important factor in the selection of DVC was that the college had their major of interest. The next most important factors to these students were location of the college (12.5%), tuition assistance (12.2%), career opportunities (11.1%), and reputation of the college (8.1%) (Question 11).
- Three point one (3.1) percent of the freshmen said they plan to obtain an Associate's degree, 47.7% stated they plan to obtain a Bachelor's degree, 30.0% stated they plan to obtain a Master's degree and 19.2% said they plan to continue on for a Doctorate degree (Question 16).

Demographics

- Forty-nine point five (49.5) percent of the freshmen responded they are female and 50.5% responded they are male (Question 37).
- Eighty-seven point eight (87.8) percent of the freshmen answered they are in the age range of 18 to 25 years, 11.5% are under 18 years old (Question 38).
- The group of freshmen surveyed is comprised of 91.9% White, non-Hispanic; 6.4% Blacks; 1.1% Hispanic; < 1% Asian/Pacific Islander, and < 1% Native American individuals (Question 39).
- Ninety-seven point two (97.2) percent of the freshmen reported that their marital status is single (Question 40).
- A majority of freshmen (60.2%) are Pennsylvania residents (Question 44).

Socio-Economic and Family Background

- Forty-four point six (44.6) percent of those freshmen responded that neither of their parents is a college graduate, 26.5% stated that both parents are college graduates and 28.9% stated that one parent is a college graduate (Question 12).
- Sixty-three point nine (63.9) percent of the freshmen stated that they are not the first in their immediate family to attend college (Question 13).
- Thirty-nine point seven (39.7) percent of the freshmen reported they have one sibling, 29.3% responded they have two siblings, 22.3% reported they have three or more siblings, and 8.7% reported they are only children (Question 14).
- Thirty-two point nine (32.9) percent of the freshmen reported that they are the oldest child in their family, 30.8% reported that they are the youngest child, 28.3% stated that they are the middle child, and 8.0% are the only child (Question 15).
- A majority of the freshmen (70.2%) answered they do not have a working ability with a language other than English (Question 34).

High School Background

- Most of the freshmen (82.2%) stated that they attended a public high school, 12.2% attended a private religious high school, 5.2% attended a private, non-sectarian high school and < 1% were home schooled (Question 41).
- Fifty-one point two (51.2) percent of the freshmen reported that the high school they attended was in a suburban setting, 32.9% reported that their high school was in a rural setting, and 13.8% said that their high school was in an urban setting (Question 42).
- Twenty-five point two (25.2) percent of the responding freshmen stated that their high school ranged in student population from between 1000 to 1500 students, 24.1% attended high schools of between 501 to 999 students, 21.3% came from high schools of 1 to 500 students, and 29.3% attended high schools with more than 1501 students (Question 43).

Study Skills and Needs and Familiarity with Student Support Services

- A majority of the freshmen (61.2%) stated that they plan to study in their dorm rooms, 31.0% anticipated studying predominantly in the library, 6.7% planned to study in “other” locations, and only 1.1% planned to study in the lounge in their dorm (Question 18).
- Fifty-nine point six (59.6) percent of the freshmen stated that they are somewhat familiar with library research, 32.8% said they are very familiar with library research and 7.6% stated they are not familiar with library research (Question 19).
- Seventy-one point one (71.1) percent of the freshmen reported that they prefer to study alone rather than in a group (Question 20).
- Most of the freshmen (51.4%) answered that they are unlikely to attend a study skills workshop (Question 21).
- Fifty-nine point nine (59.9) percent of the responding freshmen reported that they are aware of the Learning Support Services on campus (Question 28).

- Seventy point seven (70.7) percent of the freshmen stated that they are familiar with the services of a Counseling Center (Question 29), 54.5% reported that they had not used the services of a Counseling Center in the past (Question 30). Thirty-four (34.0) percent of freshmen said they used a Counseling Center in the past for career or college counseling, 9.5% reported they used a Counseling Center for career/college counseling and personal problems, 6.7% said they used it mainly for personal problems, 3.9% reported they used it for other reasons, and the majority (45.9%) said they had not used the services of a Counseling Center at all (Question 31).
- Sixty-five point four (65.4) percent of the freshmen responded that they are familiar with the services of a Tutoring Center (Question 32).
- A majority of freshmen (77.5%) said they had not used Tutoring Center services in the past (Question 33).

Computer/Media Usage

- Fifty-four point four (54.4) percent of freshmen stated they are somewhat familiar with computers, 42.5% reported they are very familiar with computers, and 3.1% said they were not familiar with computers (Question 22).
- Sixty-nine point six (69.6) percent of the freshmen reported they were unlikely to attend a computer-training workshop (Question 23).
- A majority of freshmen (85.7%) stated they will be using their own computers while a student (Question 24).
- Most of the freshmen (47.4%) said they used email at least once a day, 26.5% stated they used email several times a week, 12.2% said they used email once a week, 5.2 said they used email several times a month, and 8.7% reported they do not use email at all (Question 25).
- Sixty point eight (60.8) percent of the freshmen said they used television as their primary source of information, 15.3% reported they used the Internet as their main information source, 12.5% stated they listened to the radio as their primary source of information, 7.8% reported they read the newspaper as their main information source, and 3.6% responded that they used none of the above as their main source of information (Question 26).
- The majority of freshmen, 29.6% percent said they read local newspapers 19.7% reported they read other newspapers, 15.9% stated they read regional newspapers, 11.6% stated they read national newspapers, and 23.2% reported that they did not read newspapers (Question 27).

Use of Tobacco and Alcohol

- Ninety point one (90.1) percent of the freshmen reported that they did not smoke (Question 35).
- Fifty-five point six (55.6) percent of the freshmen responding to the survey stated they did not drink alcohol, 29.7% identified themselves as moderate drinkers when describing their alcohol consumption at any given “party” or over a typical two week period, and 14.7% said they were heavy drinkers when describing their alcohol consumption at any given “party” or over a typical two week period (Question 36).
