

"The Turnaround" of 2003: DelVal Football Legacy Begins

Over the past 20 seasons, the Delaware Valley University football program has won 82 percent of their games, with an astounding record of 190 wins and 42 losses.


In that time, the Aggies have cemented themselves as one of the elite college football programs in the country with 12 Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) Championship titles, 11 NCAA Playoff appearances, and five trips to the NCAA quarterfinal round. With every winning season, the momentum builds and the accomplishments grow. This season, the Aggies extended their win-streak against conference opponents to 53 with another undefeated conference slate. The last time DelVal lost to a MAC opponent was October 22, 2016. It is the longest such streak in the 70-year history of MAC football.

The records and the stats alone speak for themselves, but the story of where the program came from to get to where they are now is equally impressive.

In the 20 years before "The Turnaround," from 1983-2002, the team had a mere 66 wins to 131 losses and just two winning seasons, in 1983 and 1985. Even more astounding, to match the 190 wins the Aggies have in the last 20 seasons, you would have to add up all of the program's victories from the previous 53 years, spanning 1950 to 2002.

Great leadership from both coaches and players, combined with a careful recruiting strategy and a family-like environment, have paved the way for the program's success. Tradition, dedication, pride and well-played football are responsible for sustaining success.

Chrissy Lambert '22 Turned Adversity to Opportunity and Landed Her Dream Job

Lambert was a standout on the women's soccer team before her career was cut short by a series of unfortunate events. She used the adversity to reshape her identity from college athlete to young professional.

Chrissy Lambert '22 was an all-conference honoree for the women's soccer team in 2019 and had aspirations of improving her game and leading her team to success through her four years at DelVal. Unfortunately, those plans took a turn when the COVID-19 pandemic cancelled her junior season and an ACL tear during an exhibition game derailed her senior campaign, essentially ending her career.

"It was really, really hard," described Lambert. "I knew that I had to have some form of a positive outlook, just find some light at the end of the tunnel; that I had to find some purpose in it all and not just let it be a waste of a trial."

That mindset helped her find a new way to lead her team. Together, they decided it would be best to have her around as much as possible, so despite being sidelined, Lambert attended as many games and practices as she could – for her teammates, and for her own mental health. She also used it as a chance to grow.

"I used that experience as a talking point in my interview for my current job. I talked about how I found a new strength in my ability to adapt in the face of adversity and I found that I could be a leader in a way I didn't think I could."

A conservation and wildlife alumna, Lambert moved to Kalispell, Montana after graduation and is working as a non-lethal conflict prevention specialist for the USDA Wildlife Services.

Building Toward Success On and Off the Field

While DelVal football has established itself as one of the elite programs in all of Division III, Delaware Valley University's other fall athletic teams are eyeing up similar success with fresh new coaches at the helm who have plans in place to help the department to a bright future.

The newest faces to the coaching staff, getting their first crack at the helm of a collegiate program, are Shaquille Stephenson, head men's soccer coach; Stefania Swider '17, MBA '19, head field hockey coach; and Gabby Reddell '16, head cheerleading coach. They joined second-year head coaches Rachel Menin, volleyball; Ben Wilson, women's soccer; and Tim Wilson, men's and women's cross country to round out the young and enthusiastic staff of fall coaches for the Aggies.

Each program brought in new talent during the recruiting process, to mix with the steady returners they inherited, that together helped pave the way toward a new era of DelVal Athletics. Some teams saw immediate results on the field, while other programs recognized the start of any successful rebuild begins with a strong foundation, and that foundation may take a year or two to settle before the finished product can

In the coming offseason, the goal for each team will be to maintain the healthy roster sizes they have established while continuing to bring in new talent that will elevate the team's level of competition against a stout pact of athletic schools that make up the Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC). Another common goal for each head coach and their team is to increase alumni engagement to bolster fundraising efforts while showing appreciation for those that came before and paved the way for today's generation of student athletes. That begins with hosting alumni events on campus, inviting alumni to games, engaging on social media and sharing the latest news from the team with their biggest supporters.

"I really like where each program is right now and I truly believe that we have great people in place to help elevate every one of our programs to sustained success," Delaware Valley's director of Athletics Dave Duda said. "Success for every team looks different and not every program is at the same stage in its growth, but the process and the overall goals look



the same; and when you can share common goals and realize that we are all working toward the same success, that makes it all the more enjoyable because coaches root for each other and different teams support one another."

One program that competes in the fall, but is primarily regarded as a spring sport, is off to a fast start in 2023. Doug Linde, a 1991 graduate of DelVal and former basketball and golf student athlete, is in his 27th season as the head men's golf coach and saw his team take first place overall in its most recent tournament outing to close the fall season. The Aggies competed at the

Turtle Creek Invitational hosted by Arcadia University, and outlasted 13 other teams to take home their first invitational trophy since 2004. The squad combined to shoot 17-over par (305) at the course that plays to a par 72 at 6,683 yards. The Aggies had the most top-10 finishers at the event, with four student athletes reaching the feat. First-year John Brennan led DelVal with a 3-over par 75 that included 13 pars and a birdie to earn a tied-4th finish. Senior Robby Meredith fired a 76 (+4) to finish tied-7th while first-year Adam Profrock and senior Ethan Saxe each carded a 5-over par 76 to finish tied-10th. Junior Mark Gates rounded out the group with a nine-over par 81 to help

secure the win. The men's golf team will look to carry the success through the spring season and ultimately into the MAC Freedom Championships that take place April 27-28.

As football puts a bow on its sixthstraight conference championship title and the fall seasons come to an end, DelVal Athletics and its fans eagerly await the winter season with anticipation of success for the wrestling, basketball and indoor track and field programs.

Hall of Fame Induction

On Friday, September 22, the Delaware Valley University Athletics Department celebrated the induction of four distinguished alumni into its Hall of Fame. The class of 2023 included Darren Bethke '93 (football), Michelle (Cernobyl) Schwendeman '09 (field hockey), Matt Cook '11 (football) and Meghan Donovan '12 (indoor and outdoor track & field).

These outstanding student athletes set numerous school records, led as team captains and continue to give back to the community post-graduation. They achieved All-America, All-Region, and All-Conference honors, serving as role models for future Aggies.

The evening also honored Frank Wolfgang, a legendary figure in athletics who served the Middle Atlantic Conference (MAC) for 50 years, 45 of which were dedicated to DelVal as the director of athletics and head baseball coach. His induction into the MAC Hall of Fame as part of the Class of 2023 celebrated his enduring contributions to both the University and the MAC.

DelVal Community Offers Warm Welcome For Danish Exchange Students

Every fall for the past nine years, Delaware Valley University has welcomed students from the Tradium School of Business in Randers, Denmark to study with our students and experience culture in America as part of a thriving exchange student program.

The program continued this past September, with 13 Danish students visiting and staying with DelVal students, faculty, and staff members for 15 days.

Before arriving at our vibrant campus, the Danish students spend a few days in New York City immersing themselves in the fast-paced American culture and visiting iconic sites like the 9/11 memorials, Times Square, Rockefeller Center and more.

From there, they are welcomed to the University and meet their host families. The host families are volunteers from the DelVal community that include faculty, staff, and even students. This year, commuter students Ben Ghilon '25 and Caitlin Rivera '26, who traveled to Denmark with DelVal in the spring of 2023 as part of the exchange program, hosted Danish students at their homes.

For Ghilon, this year's visit served as a reunion of long-distance friends. When he studied in Denmark, he stayed with Phillip Snerle Kronborg and his family in Randers. He and Kronborg sparked an immediate friendship and kept in touch after he left and returned home. The two friends were reunited this year when Kronborg came over with the Tradium students and Ghilon returned the favor by hosting Kronborg at his family's home in Hellertown.

"Having Phillip at our home was a great experience for my family and me," said Ghilon. "He and I hit it off the day we met and now I consider him one of my very good friends. It is hard that we are so far away from each other, but it makes reuniting that much more fun."

One of the greatest takeaways for the exchange students is the time spent with host families and the lasting relationships formed. Memories are created while preparing meals at

home with the family, sharing stories that shed light on cultural traditions and their differences, and spending time doing different activities. This year, host families coordinated a bonfire that all the students enjoyed together. The hosts provided s'mores, a treat unfamiliar to the Danish, while the Danish students taught their hosts about Snobrød. Snobrød, or twist bread, is a Danish tradition of baking bread on sticks, over a fire - like how we roast marshmallows. A group of students and hosts even visited Dorney Park for its Halloween Haunt and enjoyed a spooky, thrilling time riding roller coasters.

While on campus, the Danish students join DelVal students and professors in classes like operations management, economics, stock market simulations, sports management and leadership and more. For many of the students, this is their first experience in the United States, and they aim to take in as much as they can. Through the program, they are afforded the opportunity to visit historical landmarks in Philadelphia, spend time in Amish Country, visit the Martin Guitar Factory, and even check out a Phillies game and a DelVal football game.

Reaching Above and Beyond: Opportunities with DelVal's Honors Program

The Honors Program at Delaware Valley University has grown to include 125 undergraduate students!

Students in the program complete Honors academic credits through colloquium classes that range in topics, such as Advanced Vertebrate Reproductive Morphology, History of Rock n Roll, and Ecobotany. They also complete an independent project that allows them to explore their own unique academic, vocational or personal interests in a meaningful way. For example, Parker Kilkenny '24 led a presentation on hydroponics during the A-Day festival. She shared her expertise with the community, gaining experience in public speaking and education.

Outside the classroom, students participate in Honors Program activities throughout the year, intending to build community and educate students in a holistic manner. This fall, activities included a presentation on transforming the commercial fishing industry, a guided forest therapy walk focused on meditation, and learning about a family's escape from Nazi Germany during the Holocaust. Through innovative programming, the Honors Program enhances the education of motivated and talented learners from diverse academic areas.

Ag Ambassadors Then and Now

The Ag Ambassador Program at DelVal was established in 1988 and has played a significant role in the development of leaders in agriculture at the University for the last 35 years.

Students from the School of Agriculture and Environmental Sciences are chosen as Ag Ambassadors based on academic performance, leadership qualities, and their knowledge and experience in agriculture. They represent DelVal at campus and public events, meet with industry leaders, public officials and high school students, and participate in state-sponsored events.

Linda Dolby was the first advisor and is credited with starting the program that was modeled after Penn State University's Ag Ambassador program. She recruited a sophomore horticulture major, Brad Bittner '90, to be the first representative for DelVal. Bittner remembers attending the Pennsylvania Farm Show, doing radio interviews to promote the University and giving tours to prospective students. He credits this program for giving him a sense of confidence and experience in communication.

"It was the best four years of my life, going to DelVal," said Bittner. "I was so proud of where I went to school that the Ag Ambassador was the perfect position for me because of my enthusiasm for the College and all the different majors. My intentionality to get to know people in programs that weren't necessarily my major is

something I enjoyed as well."

The program is still thriving today under the direction of Dr. Broc Sandelin, dean of Agriculture and Environmental Sciences, and with Ashleigh Moss '24 carrying the torch in her second year as the Ag Ambassador. An animal science major with a specialization in livestock science and management, Ashleigh is one of four Ag Ambassadors who represent DelVal in the same fashion that Bittner did over 30 years ago. Claire Cohick '24, Rianne Green '26, and Justin Rosenberger '24 join Moss as the current representatives.

DelVal now has a booth at the Pennsylvania Farm Show that Moss and her peers decorate where they host activities to provide an interactive and engaging experience for children and families.

"I am most looking forward to the week of Farm Show because I am able to talk to the public about our school and meet alumni and see where their degrees have taken them," Moss explained with enthusiasm.

A native of Kutztown, Pa. and a Kutztown Area High School graduate, Moss has been working in agriculture for a long time, making her a perfect fit for the role.

Tim Weingartner '24, a food technology major at DelVal, spent last summer in Milwaukee, Wisconsin working in the pilot brewery at Molson Coors headquarters. He saw the job posting on LinkedIn and immediately applied, knowing that this was an opportunity he could not pass up. Weingartner was one of about 30 interns selected for the program in Milwaukee.

Weingartner, who was featured on an episode of The Chef's Kitchen: College Campus Cooking, spent a year in culinary school before transferring to DelVal. His decision to transfer stemmed from a desire to explore the science and research and development side of the food and beverage industry and the generous transfer package he received.

Dream Internship at Molson Coors Exceeded Expectations for Tim Weingartner '24

Weingartner spent a summer at Molson Coors' pilot brewery in Milwaukee, Wisconsin and walked away with clarity and confidence ahead of his senior year at DelVal.

The pilot brewery is where Molson Coors carries out R&D for new products. In his role as a beverage research and development intern, Weingartner worked with various beverage lines, from seltzers and nonalcoholic beers to some of the more popular products like Blue Moon. He also participated in sensory testing, a process in which the brewery invites industry professionals to sample and evaluate new products in preparation for production.

One aspect he cherished most about the job was the people he encountered. "I've never met so many different people passionate about the same thing working together," Weingartner expressed. "There were a lot of people that were chefs who switched [industries], so to see things full circle and to see professionals with a similar career path as me was very cool."

Before he knew he would venture into the beer industry, Weingartner had an opportunity to work handson with the product as part of his curriculum at DelVal. During one of his courses, students crafted their own beer, and Weingartner drew from this experience, along with his chemistry coursework, in his interviews with Molson Coors, which he believes played a pivotal role in securing the internship. While at DelVal, he also completed internships

at Bakerly, a food manufacturing supply company in Easton, Pa and with Schreiber Foods, a consumer brand leader in cream cheese, natural cheese, processed cheese, beverages and yogurt.

With a well-rounded resume and a wealth of hands-on experience. Weingartner is confident that his credentials and knowledge will pave the way for a job he's passionate about upon his graduation in May 2024.

Spark Bowl Inspires Student Entrepreneurs

This year's Spark Bowl competition, hosted by the Central Bucks Chamber of Commerce, Startup Bucks, and Delaware Valley University, features five small businesses from various industries.

The competition, held in the Life Sciences Building auditorium, gives each finalist team 15 minutes to pitch their idea to a panel of judges. In a "Shark Tank"-like style, the judges then ask the finalists questions and debrief. The judges then place the businesses as first, second or third.

As part of DelVal's experiential learning program, DelVal students work with the businesses to prepare for the competition under the guidance of DelVal faculty and advisors of our Small Business and Entrepreneurship Center.

The five finalist teams this year represent the following industries: food, management software and applications, indoor farming and baby products.

Last year, a total of \$21,000 was awarded to businesses, and student teams received a total of \$6,000.

Joseph Musa '23, MBA'25 is working with Samantha Myers, CEO and founder of 365DayDreams, LLC. Samantha's finalist team, Bye Bye Cry, is introducing the first ever portable sound machine that has been designed to soothe colicky

and fussy babies. Musa notes that his participation in Spark Bowl is a distinctive and instructive journey, leaving an enduring imprint on his understanding of the intricacies within a startup enterprise. "This experience has proven to be an invaluable resource that continues to shape my approach to professional endeavors," explained Musa. He has been a student consultant for the past three Spark Bowl competitions. Last year, Musa collaborated with Bake Ability Bakery. This partnership provided him with an enlightening firsthand experience of the multifaceted demands and realities of entrepreneurship, and allowed him to gain a comprehensive grasp of the costs involved in launching and maintaining a business, as well as the strategies required for enduring

Evan Royer '25, a business administration major and horticulture minor, has paired with Jerah Siegal, founder of BioDome. BioDome places indoor farming units (BioDomes) on top of apartment buildings in cities, and offers a CSA service to the tenants who live there.

The BioDomes use solar energy, rainwater collection and filtration, and aeroponics, and are fully computer automated in the growing process. For Royer, BioDome combines his two biggest passions, gardening and greenhouse work. The student team for BioDome includes Evan and Christopher Adschiew '25. "Chris and I have helped Jerah form a 5-minute pitch based off a rubric we have which the judges will be using," said Royer. He notes that Jerah gave great insight on what it means to start up a business. Having worked in his own family business, Royer had prior knowledge of business operations. "Hearing Jerah's perspective about how he started his business and the challenges he has faced was very insightful for me," explained Royer.

The Farm Stand, located at Terrain on DelVal's campus, provides the community with fresh produce each Saturday during the growing season.

A variety of produce is provided from weekend to weekend from early summer to mid-fall. 
